

List of Canoe molds and brief description with photos.

11-foot Moore canoe, one person canoe suitable for a trapper, someone wanting a small canoe or for children. Model designed and built by Bert Moore and later purchased by Victor Miller. Currently there is a 12-foot canoe being built on this model.

The Moore model is a 20 foot canoe that is used to build canoes up to 26 feet and can be modified as a V stern to hold an outboard motor. The design was to allow guides to transport sports and supplies up the Little Tobique River to Nictau Lake and has been very popular over the years. It was used on log drives as well as salmon fishing. The mold is a bit bigger than the Miller and is in excellent condition. Vic Miller acquired this mold in 1956 from Bert Moore. A canoe has been started on this mold.




Here are the 11' and 20' Moore on the shop floor



This mold below is the original 1925 Miller canoe model that is 19' long. It was designed for a tripping canoe with lots of space for gear and is a superb Poling canoe for shallow rivers and a proven design that has lasted for almost a century.


The 14-foot kayak is sitting on top of the 19 foot Miller was designed by Bill Miller in the 1990's. It makes a nice touring boat, and a very stable duck hunting platform.

The last two molds are the 14-foot Kingfisher designed by Bill Miller in the 1980's as a white water solo canoe with higher sides for carrying good size loads to remote places. Under this model is the 20-foot Gallop model that was designed as a freighter canoe. This model can be extended as the 20-foot Moore and also can accommodate a Vee stern design for an out board motor.
